

Differences between K-12 & College

Grades K-12	Community College
Student has the right to a free and appropriate public education	Student has the right to equal access to education; admission and continued participation are dependent on eligibility and satisfactory progress
School district identifies student and documents disability	Student provides documentation of disability and need for accommodation
District is responsible for developing Individual Educational Plan (IEP); 504 plan follows student from elementary school, to middle school, to high school	Student must notify the college regarding disability and need for services
Student is entitled to services identified on IEP; school district ensures that IEP is implemented and services are delivered	No IEP; student is responsible for requesting and utilizing services and/or accommodations; college services are not automatic; each college decides eligibility and services
Parents and teachers advocate for student	Student self-advocates; process is more cooperative, deliberative, and interactive
Program of study may be fundamentally altered to fit the student	Accommodations may not alter fundamental nature of course or impose undue burden on institution
Student may have right to success; institution is responsible for student's success	Student is responsible for meeting requirements for academic success
Personal services are provided (e.g., nurse, personal attendant care, transportation)	No personal services provided
School staff communicates with parents	Students are treated as adults, with confidentiality rights. Information can only be shared off-campus with written authorization; on-campus, it's shared on a "need-to-know" basis.



Additional Differences

- **Students is responsible for**
 - initiating teacher notification – if you don't let your teachers know about your services, they won't know to let you use them (FNL Form).
 - managing their own time and schedule – there is no bell schedule.
 - meeting the expectations of the course - **No assignment modifications.**
- **Student decides:**
 - their course of study “major”
 - the number of units in which they wish to enroll each semester (0-15)
 - he services they wish to use and when.
- **Remember:**
 - Everyone has different goals in college.
 - Class schedules may vary with time and days.
 - We recommend using the COS Tutorial Center, Math Lab, and Writing Center to help with student success.

AAC \neq Special Education

College does not have special education classes; students use accommodations.

The Access and Ability Center works with students with qualifying conditions to ensure equal access to their education by:

- Encouraging self-advocacy, abilities, and skill development through various services





NOTE: At a Community College, one's application is not contingent upon "acceptance" like at universities; you may enroll in classes after applying to the college on your assigned date.

STEPS TO ENROLL

- 1. Apply for COS via [CCCApply](#)**
 - After applying, you will receive an email with MyGiant login credentials and Banner ID
 - 2. Apply for AAC**
 - Student logs into [COS MyGiant portal](#) and completes the “Access & Ability Center AIM Application”
-

- Submit Verification Documents (IEPs, 504 Plans, etc) with the AIM application (**NOTE:** AAC cannot process the application without the verification)
 - 3. Attend Intake Appointment to Receive AAC Services**
 - 4. Complete FAFSA or the Dream Act Application.**
 - 5. Register for classes during [AAC STEPS \(first week of April\)](#) with [Zoom help if needed](#) (*must have completed steps 1-3*)**
 - 6. Complete COS Orientation** (Online or by attending Giant Days, end of July/beginning of August)
 - 7. Complete AAC Orientation:** Bridge to COS Event (Online or Zoom, beginning of August)

- The individual must have a physical or mental impairment
- The impairment(s) constitutes or results in a significant impediment to employment
- VR services are required to secure, retain or regain employment

- Career Education & Training
- Tuition, Books, Transportation (required to apply financial aid funds first)
- Job Search and Interview Skills
- Assistive Technology




