PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Community members, students, faculty, and staff -

The College of the Sequoias is pleased to present our annual community report for the 2023-24 school year. As in previous years, the community report will summarize events of the year, provide data in several key areas related to our 2015-2025 Master Plan goals and 2021-2025 Strategic Plan objectives, and share stories about the students and employees that make the College such a wonderful place to work and attend school.

The District had another amazing year including near-record highs in degrees awarded, certificates awarded, and transfer students. The District was also able to expand and renovate its three campuses in numerous ways including the Educational Support Services building on the Visalia campus; the Applied Technology and Trades Complex on the Tulare campus officially at full capacity in January 2025; and a central quad renovation and solar project on the Hanford campus. On the Visalia campus, the District also opened Sequoias Stadium and the Giant Marketplace to start the school year!

Students were also very active during the year. The Men's basketball team made its fifth straight appearance in the CCCAA's Elite 8 State Tournament in March and advanced to the championship game before narrowly losing to undefeated West Valley College. The COS Theater was also a busy place all year including an amazing two-week run of Anastasia. And finally, former Giant, Quincy Hall, made us all proud when he won Gold in the 400M at the Olympic Games in Paris, France.

The District's budget also remained stable allowing for cost-of-living adjustments to all employee groups while also allowing the District to eliminate most long-term debt, maintain and modernize buildings, and purchase land to expand the current Fresno State South Valley Campus. The College was also able to complete most of the preliminary design work for the new University Center to be completed during the 2027-28 year.

In all, it was another great year to be a Giant and we are looking forward to the 2024-25 school year.

DEEP ROOTS AT THE WORLD AG EXPO

The World Ag Expo at the Tulare Agri-Center is the largest annual agricultural trade show in the United States, drawing exhibitors and attendees from around the globe. The World Ag Expo serves as a hub for showcasing the latest advancements in agricultural technology, equipment, and industry trends. College of the Sequoias (COS) staff and students have participated at the World Ag Expo which provides an opportunity, particularly, for those enrolled in agriculture-related programs offering a unique platform for students to gain firsthand experience, network with industry leaders, and showcase the strengths of COS's programs and facilities.

"This is the biggest trade show for agriculture, the biggest farm show throughout the country. The opportunity for our students and for our career services staff to interact with employers, to let them know about our students, is invaluable." said Dr. Louann Waldner, COS Tulare Campus Provost. Dr. Waldner emphasized the diverse opportunities available to students, from agriculture to industrial maintenance and business, all of which benefit from the robust agricultural sector. "Tulare County is the largest producer in the country," she added, "and the chance for our students to see the support that agriculture provides to our community and the kind of jobs it creates is why we at COS, particularly the Tulare Campus, make a presence here."

Shannan Cooper, Agriculture Business faculty at COS, echoed these sentiments, stressing the importance of the World Ag Expo for student development. "The Expo is such an important opportunity for our students. They have a chance to see the latest and greatest technology in agriculture and learn about the job opportunities that are out there for them," Shannan explained. She highlighted the networking aspect, saying, "One of the greatest opportunities is the networking that can occur at an event like this. Students get the chance to engage with potential employers, learn about different parts of the industry, and maybe even find their interest in it."



Students themselves also recognize the value of participating in the World Ag Expo. Cassie Smith, an Animal Science major and Vice President of the Agriculture Council, shared her thoughts on the event's impact: "World Ag Expo is very beneficial for students just to learn about things within the ag community, like different types of equipment and potential job opportunities. It's a great networking event. A lot of what people say is, it's who you know, not what you know. So networking is very important, and that's something you can really accomplish at the World Expo."

Jessie Macias Jr., President of the Agriculture Council and a double major in Agriculture Business and Animal Science, described the World Ag Expo as a homecoming of sorts, given its deep roots in his hometown of Tulare County. "Honestly, COS is home to me," Jessie said. "I could have gone to other colleges, but I decided to stay home, especially when you're in the dairy capital of the world. Why wouldn't you stay home? The World Ag Expo has been a part of my life since I was two months old, and it's something I look forward to every year." Jessie's deep connection to the Expo and the agriculture community is a testament to the lasting impact such events can have on students.

The World Ag Expo is more than just an event; it's an educational milestone for COS students, offering them a real-world glimpse into the agricultural industry and the chance to forge meaningful connections that will serve them well in their future careers.

CELEBRATING HERITAGE

College of the Sequoias (COS) is committed to fostering an inclusive and supportive environment for its diverse student body. This commitment is evident in the various heritage celebrations that COS hosts, which recognize and honor the cultural backgrounds of its students. These celebrations not only provide a platform for students to connect with their heritage but also serve as a vital tool for community building amongst students.

The Tulare Kings Counties Students of Color Recognition Celebration is hosted by the COS Historically Black Colleges and Universities Program. The event invites High School Seniors and COS Graduates to participate in a graduation celebration representing students of color. During the Spring 2024 event, 97 students participated, including over 25 COS students. The event highlights the importance COS places on acknowledging the achievements of students of color as they transition to the next stages of their lives. COS shares the excitement of these milestone moments with their students and the broader community emphasizing the values and support available to the diverse student population. The Recognition Celebration is not just a ceremony; it's a testament to COS's dedication to creating a safe and welcoming environment for all students, particularly those from underrepresented backgrounds. This event also serves as a recruiting tool, showing prospective students and their families that COS is a place where they will be seen, heard, and celebrated.

Another significant event is *Celebrando Nuestro Futuro*, which is tailored specifically for Latino/è students and their families. With over 70% of the COS student population identifying as Latino/è, this event holds particular importance. *Celebrando Nuestro Futuro* provides a bilingual and culturally inclusive space where students and their families can celebrate graduation accomplishments together. This event is especially meaningful for first-generation college graduates, as it allows their families, many of whom may speak primarily Spanish, to fully engage in this important milestone. By honoring the language and culture of these families, COS reinforces its role as a home for the Latino/è community and commitment to educational equity.

The Native American Student Gathering is another crucial event that COS has introduced, with 40 students attending the inaugural gathering. The event brought together students from various high schools and educational programs, as well as representatives from Fresno State's American Indian Programs and Services. The gathering featured a blessing from Wukchumni Elder, Jennifer Malone and testimonials from Native students, including COS Alumni. This gathering was more than just an event; it was a space where Native students felt seen, heard, and valued. The words of Wukchumni Elder and COS Alumnus Darlene Franco resonated deeply with attendees, as she reflected on how different her experience would have been if she had access to such resources and support.

COS ALUMNI WINS GOLD AT PARIS OLYMPICS

Quincy Hall, a proud graduate of College of the Sequoias (COS), has achieved what many athletes only dream of—becoming an Olympic Gold Medalist. Hall's journey from COS to the pinnacle of international athletic achievement is a story of perseverance, talent, and unyielding dedication.

Born and raised in Kansas City, Missouri, Hall displayed an early passion for track and field. His exceptional speed and agility quickly caught the attention of coaches, leading him to College of the Sequoias, where he would hone his skills and rise to prominence as one of the college's standout athletes. At COS, Hall's talent was nurtured by a supportive environment that emphasized both academic and athletic excellence. Under the guidance of Coach Curtis Allen, he developed the discipline and work ethic that would eventually propel him to international success.

While at COS, Hall specialized in the 400-meter hurdles, a challenging event that requires not only speed but also precise technique and mental focus. He quickly made a name for himself, dominating the competition at the community college level and setting records that still stand today. His success at COS earned him a scholarship to the University of South Carolina, where he continued to excel, eventually becoming a collegiate champion and securing his place among the nation's top track and field athletes.

Hall's journey to the Olympics was marked by hard work and resilience. After overcoming injuries and setbacks, which held him back from the Tokyo Olympics, he breezed his way through the 2023 World Athletics Championships in Budapest. Quincy ran a personal best time of 44.37 to win a bronze medal and helped his team win gold in the 4x400 meter relay. In June 2024 at the BAUHAUS-galan in Stockholm,



Quincy placed first in the 400 meter race, qualifying him for the Paris Olympics. His performance was nothing short of spectacular.

Quincy Hall added another remarkable achievement to his track and field career by winning a gold medal at the 2024 Paris Olympics. His performance in the 400 meter race was a highlight of the Games, demonstrating his continued dominance in the sport and solidifying his status as one of the world's top athletes.

Quincy Hall's achievement at the 2024 Olympics not only adds to his personal accolades but also serves as an inspiration to aspiring athletes, especially those from community colleges like College of the Sequoias. His journey from COS to Olympic champion is a powerful testament to what can be accomplished with hard work, dedication, and the right support system.

PARAMEDIC PROGRAM

College of the Sequoias Launches New Paramedic Program

College of the Sequoias (COS) launched a highly anticipated Paramedic Program at the Hanford Campus, aimed at addressing the growing need for skilled emergency medical professionals in the Central Valley.

With a long-standing tradition of excellence in education, COS continues to expand its offerings to meet the evolving needs of the region. The Paramedic Program is a testament to the dedication of training highly skilled healthcare professionals. This new initiative is not just an expansion but a significant milestone that showcases COS's commitment to fostering exceptional talent in the medical field.

“College of the Sequoias has been teaching its traditional Emergency Medical Technician Basic course since 1973. Today, it is extremely exciting to see our program expand to include the more advanced Paramedic level course,” shared Nick Branch, COS Paramedic Program Director. “In addition to the new Paramedic courses, we are also rolling out a formal Associates Degree program that will allow our Paramedic students to be recognized by formal education for the first time at COS. The Central Valley’s Emergency Medical Service Providers pride themselves on providing the highest level of Paramedic care to our communities, and COS is proud to support these agencies by offering this program.”

The Paramedic Program at COS is designed to provide students with a well-rounded education, combining essential theoretical knowledge with practical skills and real-world

clinical experiences. The curriculum covers a broad spectrum of critical topics, including emergency medical techniques, patient assessment, cardiac care, trauma care, pharmacology, and more. The program's accredited curriculum is developed in accordance with the latest industry standards, ensuring that graduates are well-prepared for their careers. Courses are taught by experienced paramedics and healthcare professionals who are passionate about training the next generation of emergency medical specialists. Students will have the chance to participate in simulation labs, clinical rotations, and field experiences, providing them with invaluable real-world experience. Additionally, the program includes comprehensive support services and resources to help students transition smoothly into rewarding careers as paramedics.

CURATING FUTURE ARTISTS WITH COS ART GALLERY

The College of the Sequoias Art Gallery on the Visalia campus hosts a comprehensive gallery exhibition course taught by Art Gallery Director, Amie Rangel. In addition to teaching the course, she manages the art gallery and teaches studio courses like figure drawing and color-and-design. The hands-on approach provides students with skills and experiences, preparing them for various roles within the art world.

The gallery exhibition course is especially interesting during the final spring exhibit where students navigate in a team, the intricate process of curating, measuring, and properly hanging artwork. Each step, from identifying and processing artwork with condition reports to ensure proper labeling and leveling, mirrors the standards practiced in galleries and museums worldwide.

Amie's top priority is for her students to gain meaningful skills that are applicable to gallery and museum settings. The exhibition course attracts students from diverse disciplines, not just studio majors like history, anthropology, and business, fostering a rich learning environment. By the end of the course, Amie aims for students to appreciate the effort behind exhibitions and to recognize the employment opportunities available in this field.

Students also gain first-hand experience in gallery operations. They learn how to properly handle artwork, assist curators, and manage exhibition logistics. This practical training prepares them for

various job titles, such as Gallery Preparator, Gallery Technician, Gallery Assistant, Archivist, Registrar, Curator, and Exhibition Designer. These roles encompass a range of responsibilities, from handling artwork and preparing exhibition spaces to performing detailed paperwork and designing aesthetically pleasing arrangements.

Amie emphasizes that the course offers more than just technical skills. Students develop strong communication abilities, learning to convey safety needs and collaborate on ideas. The course encourages a sense of community, students to work as a team, with each member contributing unique skills toward a common goal. Students form a close-knit group, honing their ability to communicate effectively and work together efficiently. These skills are crucial for success in any gallery or museum setting.

Amie Rangel's gallery exhibition course is a unique opportunity for students to immerse themselves in the art of curation. With hands-on experience and practical training, students leave the course well-equipped for various roles in the art world. Whether working in a gallery, museum, or simply appreciating exhibitions, students gain valuable skills and insights that extend far beyond the classroom. The gallery exhibition course is a standout unique experience, preparing the next generation of art professionals for a bright future in the field.



The College of the Sequoias (COS) Tulare Campus is set to expand and achieve a significant milestone with the completion of its Applied Technology and Trades Complex, expected to be finished during the Fall 2024 semester. Courses will officially begin at full capacity in January 2025, marking the culmination of the Measure J funds, which has been instrumental in the campus's expansion. The three new buildings added to this phase of construction at the Tulare Campus will transform campus life for students, creating a comprehensive hub for trade and technology education.

With the completion of Phase II, the Tulare Campus will serve as a one-stop shop for local industries in need of a skilled workforce. The newly constructed buildings, next to the existing 11,000-square-foot welding shop, will form a state-of-the-art education and training complex. The facility will host 11 full-time faculty members and multiple adjunct instructors drawn from local industries, offering students access to expert knowledge and real-world experience. The programs within the complex will train students as technicians across a wide range of disciplines, including industrial maintenance, automation, automotive technology, construction, HVAC, and electrician training.

The Applied Technology and Trades Complex is comprised of four buildings—three new and one existing—housing programs from both the Industry & Technology Division and the Agriculture Division. This modern, adaptable facility is designed to evolve alongside industry trends, particularly as sectors become more automated and technology driven. Despite this forward-looking approach, the complex will maintain a strong focus on teaching the fundamental skills essential for any career in industrial, manufacturing, or agricultural fields.

In addition to its 52,000 square feet of shop and classroom space, the complex boasts nearly two acres of outdoor work space. These include a covered space for industry events, a “sandbox” for hands-on construction and electrician training, a pump and filter training station, and ample room for power equipment and vehicle demonstrations, ensuring that students receive practical, hands-on learning experiences that are directly applicable to their future careers. The expansion represents a major step forward for the College of the Sequoias, enhancing its ability to meet the demands of both students and local industry workforce. This new addition is not only a source of pride for College of the Sequoias but is a critical investment in the region's economic future, providing students with the tools and knowledge needed to succeed in high-demand career fields.

Held periodically throughout the academic year, the Meet & Greet events are open to all COS students, offering them an invaluable opportunity to engage directly with representatives from diverse industries. The primary goal of the Meet & Greet event is to bridge the gap between education and employment. For many students, navigating the job market can be daunting, and these events aim to demystify the process by offering

firsthand advice on resumes, interviews, and job search strategies. COS Career Services staff are on hand to provide personalized guidance, ensuring that students are well-prepared to make a positive impression.

Brenden Denny, a COS Fashion student, shared his experience: “Being able to get advice and knowledge from people working within the industry was such a privilege and allowed us so much insight into aspects we don’t see. It helped me understand what I could do and what I should start doing if I wanted to pursue that.”

Each event typically features a mix of presentations, panel discussions, and informal networking sessions. Employers have the chance to showcase their organizations, highlight available opportunities, and discuss the skills and attributes they value most in candidates. Students, in turn, can ask questions, share their career aspirations, and gain a clearer understanding of the paths available to them after graduation.

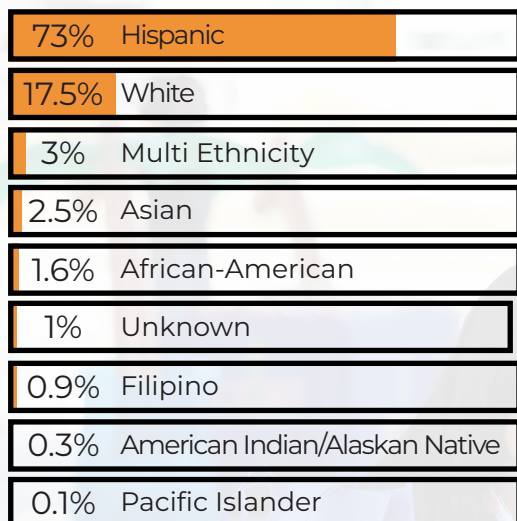

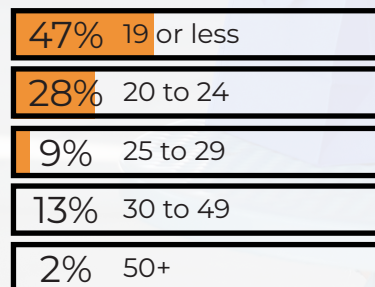
STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

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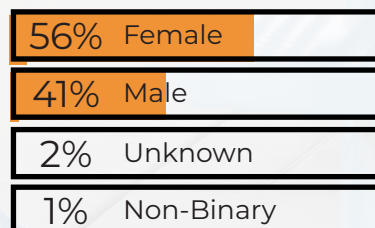
RACE/ETHNICITY DISTRIBUTION

EMPOWERING FUTURE HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS

The College of the Sequoias (COS) in partnership with University of California San Francisco, Fresno Campus, has launched a transformative Pre-Medical Bridge Program. This initiative addresses regional healthcare disparities by preparing undergraduate students for medical school starting at the community college level. The Central Valley's agricultural richness contrasts with its significant healthcare challenges, necessitating healthcare professionals who understand and are committed to the community's unique needs.

In March 2024, COS, in collaboration with the San Joaquin Valley-MedBridge Program, recently welcomed 12 exceptional students chosen for their academic achievements and commitment to healthcare. "We are thrilled to welcome these talented individuals to the College of the Sequoias pathway with the SJV-MedBridge Program," said Tess Hernandez, MESA Program Director. "Our mission is to empower future healthcare professionals with the knowledge and skills necessary to excel in their careers; and hopefully return to the Central Valley."

The program offers rigorous academic training, including science coursework, specialized counseling, MCAT prep, and research opportunities. UCSF Fresno provides students with invaluable clinical experiences through shadowing physicians, participating in medical rounds, and hands-on clinical activities.

"Through the SJV-MedBridge program, I have gained a deeper understanding of the pathway into medicine," said Jasmin Neri Sanchez, COS Alumni 2023. "The monthly workshops have made me confident in my abilities to bring a unique perspective into the field. I got the opportunity to meet various physicians, residents, and medical students who helped me discover the type of doctor I aspire to be. As I get ready to apply to medical school, I intend to make full use of the resources I have received. I now have a clearer picture of the application process and have created a personal timeline that aligns with my own experiences"

Mentorship is crucial, pairing students with experienced medical professionals who offer guidance and support. "Many non-traditional students are nervous about pursuing careers that require many years of schooling. Connecting them

with medical students and residents allows them to see the light at the end of a very long educational journey and is invaluable to helping them persist." Tess Hernandez.

The program's inaugural cohort will be preparing to apply to medical school this fall. "We are proud to see our graduates succeed and hopefully return to serve the Central Valley," said Tess Hernandez. COS and UCSF Fresno continue to expand the program, aiming to create a sustainable pipeline of healthcare professionals dedicated to improving their community's health and well-being.

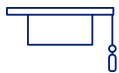
