	Course Objectives
1	Provide abrief history of crime and the criminal justice system in America.
2	Critically analyze and discuss issues of crime and justice from varying cultural, ethnic, and Western/non-Western societal perspectives.
3	Identify and describe special issues in the criminal justice system involving juvenile delinquency, drugs, and their future development.
4	Demonstrate an understanding of the history, structure, and function of the police.
5	Understand the history, development, and structure, and function of American police, courts, and corrections.
6	Explain the methods, theories, and concepts associated with the sources of crime data, the emerging patterns of criminal activity, and the costs of crime.
7	Demonstrate an understanding of criminological theories used to explain crime and criminality and the social implications of crime on society.
8	Understand the extent of the crime problem in America and future implications utilizing the social, technological, economic, environmental, and political (STEEP) analysis
9	Explain the definitions of crime.



10	Effectively follow the appropriate writing style practiced in the social sciences.
11	Demonstrate the ability to raise critically relevant questions, including social justice issues and calls for reform, based on independent reading of criminal justice literature and course lectures.
12	Utilize conclusions from scholarly research, course lectures, and dialogue, in creating informed positions on controversial issues in criminal justice.
13	Show an understanding of corrections including the roles of probation, parole, and community corrections; as well as the functions of prisons and jails.
14	Convey an understanding of the process of adjudication and the social implications on society and historically disenfranchised communities.
15	Explain how multiculturalism and diversity present special challenges to, and opportunities for, the American system of criminal justice.
16	Explain the meaning of due process, and identify where due process guarantees can be found in the American legal system.
17	Describe the process of American criminal justice, including the stages of case processing.
18	Explain the structure of the American criminal justice system in terms of its major components and the functions they serve.

Course Outcomes:

	Course Outcomes
1	Students will be able to describe the history, objectives and functions of the criminal justice system in America.
2	Students will be able to differentiate between and explain the role of each of the three branches of the criminal justice system.
3	Students will be able to create informed positions on controversial justice issues and explain balancing the need to protect individual rights and the need for public order through the administration of justice.
4	Students will be able to discuss theories of crime and compare the effectiveness of various social responses to crime and criminals.

Assignments:

Assignment Type:	Details
Reading	Each week students will read an assigned chapter in the textbook and United States Supreme Court cases that are mentioned in the chapter. Their thinking about the issue involved in the case will be informed by their reading and they will ultimately write a paper analyzing the case arguments and decision.
Writing	Students will write a 500 word paper using APA style, on a law enforcement, court and correctional issue, analyzing and explaining the issue. Papers will be written at a college level, including accurate citations, spelling and grammar.
Homework	For a typical homework assignment, students will read a chapter in the assigned textbook then answer essay, fill in the blank, and multiple choice questions.
