3	Delinquency, Status Offenses and Dependency: Critically distinguish between delinquency, status offenses, and dependency.
4	Adult vs Juvenile Justice Systems: Critically analyze the distinctions between the adult and juvenile justice systems.

Assignments:

Assignment Type:	Details
Reading	Each week students will read an assigned chapter in the textbook and additional supplemental articles/reports. 2. Each week students will read 50-75 pages in a second book assigned for a book report, to be written later in the semester.
Writing	The students will complete a 1,000 word essay/book review using APA format on a book related to juvenile delinquency. An outline and first draft will be submitted, instructor comments will be noted and the student will then submit the final version.
Homework	Students will interview a professional in the juvenile justice field and present that information to the class.
Other	In groups, students will use critical thinking to analyze, discuss and debate ethical scenarios in the juvenile justice system.
