Course Topics	
1	The equine scorecard - Areas of importance, Body parts of equine, External body part evaluation as it relates to function.
2	Understanding the scorecard for different disciplines- Halter, Western pleasure, English pleasure, Reining and performance ranch riding.
3	Scoring- Understanding cuts of evaluators' points, Knowledge of mathematical scoring system.
4	Evaluation and placement of the horse class.
5	Preparation and presentation of oral reasons- Selection of correct terms, Justify placing of the horse class, Memorization skills, and organization of presentation and delivery.
6	Equine conformation - Halter, Western pleasure, English pleasure, Reining and Performance Ranch Riding.
7	Preparation of written reasons- Selection of terms used in reasons, Connective terminology, Notetaking Ability to write under pressure, Quick assessment of visual data in written form.
8	Comparison to the breed- Grouping body parts as they relate to the scorecard, Characteristics among breeds and various uses.

Course Objectives:

Course Objectives	
1	Communicate the reasons for the placings to an official judge.
2	Calculate correctly one's own scorecard based on cuts given by the official.
3	Determine correct placement of the classes quickly and objectively.
4	Understand structure and motion, lameness and soundness for each discipline.
5	Be able to defend the selection and ranking of horses in both oral reasons and written format.
6	Differentiate between desirable and non-desirable horses based upon conformation and physical characteristics.
7	Identify the parts of a horse and the characteristics of its breed.
8	Analyze the positive and negative characteristics of horse at halter or in a performance.
9	Assess the horse's desirable conformation traits.
10	Organize and memorize reasons for placing horse classes and be able to express them under time constraints.

1	Upon completion of this course students will be able to select and rank four horses number one to number four based upon selection standards as stated by the equine industry.

Assignments:

Assignment Type:	Details
Reading	Students will be required to read the judges manual that will be accessible on Canvas. After reading chapters in the manual, quizzes will be given for retention and demonstration of knowledge .
Writing	Students will be required to write reasons when evaluating horses. All classes judged will require written reasons.
Homework	Students will be required to memorize horse parts, various faults and positive traits. Students will be held accountable for homework via evaluating horses. If homework is not done, it will be evident when giving reasons on the classes judged.
Lab	Students will be asked to evaluate different equines and disciplines at the equine barn. A class of four horses will be judged at one time with the students taking notes, rationalizing placings and giving oral reasons as to their placings.
