Course Outcomes:

	Course Outcomes
1	Sign Production: Given a statement or question about a concrete object, students will be able to respond using appropriate signs and classifiers. Students will use appropriate facial expressions for negative and positive answers. Students will demonstrate competency by producing adequate responses with little interference in communication.
2	Syntax and Vocabulary: Given the opportunity to tell a personal short story, students will be able to use integrative syntax, expanded vocabulary [objectives indicate usable vocabulary of 600 signs], and idioms to produce a coherent message. As spontaneous tangents emerge from the story, students will be able to use the conventions of breaking into a dialogue and understand finger-spelled names and abbreviations at a normal rate of delivery.
3	Deaf Culture: Given the task to recognize specific cultural traditions and circumstances of the deaf community, students will be able to describe culture-specific customs, explain how misunderstanding arises across cultures, and identify pervasive values of deaf culture in writing, oral presentations, or discussions. Students will demonstrate competency by producing adequate responses with little interference in communication.

Assignments:

Assignment Type:	Details
Reading	Students will read assigned chapters from the textbook as well as assigned readings via the internet. For example, to learn about family signs, students will read "Talking about Your Family".
Writing	Students will watch Ted Talk videos about ASL and deaf culture and write a short essay in response to what they learned through Ted Talk videos.
Homework	Students will create questions and responses in correct ASL structure. For example, students will be asked to translate English sentences into ASL.
