The Office of Research, Planning, and Institutional Effectiveness (R-PIE) developed the Curious Giant series to communicate and highlight data to District employees. The purpose of the Curious Giant is to inform and increase the District employees' awareness and usage of data.

One to two Curious Giant correspondences are emailed each month and cover different points of data and/or topics. Where applicable, the Curious Giant correspondence provides readers with a link to the cited data source and encourages them to explore additional data within that source.

Between August 2023 and May 2024, 10 Curious Giant correspondences were emailed to the District employees. The topics covered included an overview of the Program Review and Student Equity Plan dashboards, first-time student enrollment trends compared to feeder high schools' demographics, challenges experienced by first-generation students as well as students' educational goals, transfer acceptance rates and volume, and transfer student outcomes.

We respond!


The <u>Program Review Dashboard</u> functions as a one-stop-shop for your academic program planning needs. This dashboard contains key metrics such as success rates, unduplicated headcounts, census enrollments, excused withdrawal rates, program majors, awards, full-time equivalent students (FTES), full-time equivalent faculty (FTEF) and FTES/FTEF ratio. Users may disaggregate course success rates (including and excluding EWs), unduplicated headcounts, census enrollments, withdrawal rates, and excused withdrawal rates by the following characteristics:

Users may select up to three of these filters at a time to explore intersectionality, which allows for better insight into equity gaps at the District, department, or course level. Users may also filter the data by term or annual data, time frame, department, course, credit courses, CTE, and Work Experience. 
The Curious Giant asks: How satisfied are students with the quality of education at COS?

We respond!

Overall, 98% of students who responded to the 2023 Student Support Services Survey ("Mother Lode") are satisfied with the quality of education at COS, which is the same percentage as the 2021 survey. Students from the Hanford Center (98%), Tulare Center (98%), and Visalia campus (98%) reported the same rate of satisfaction when compared to the District.



The Curious Giant asks: What obstacles/issues are most challenging to COS students' education?

We respond!

Among students who responded to the 2021 and 2023 Student Support Services Survey ("Mother Lode") the three obstacles/issues most often reported as very challenging to their educational pursuits were 1) balancing work and school, 2) financial/money issues, and 3) balancing family and school. The percentage of students reporting these issues as very challenging decreased from 2021 to 2023. The only issue that had an increase in the percentage of students reporting it as very challenging was transportation which increased by one percentage point, and the percentage of students reporting food insecurity as very challenging has remained the same.



The Curious Giant asks: Are first-generation students at COS completing transfer-level math & English within their first year at the same rate as non-first-generation students?

We respond!

Examining transfer-level math and English completion rates for the five most recent years (2017-2021) indicates that first-generation students at COS were disproportionately impacted. Although COS first-generation students made progress in transfer-level math and English completion, their completion rates were significantly lower than non-first-generation students attending COS.

The 2022 COS Student Equity Plan Dashboard allows users to explore disproportionate impacts among various student groups. The metrics consist of 1) successful enrollment, 2) transfer-level math & English completion, 3) persistence, 4) vision goal attainment, and 5) transferred to a 4-year. These metrics can be disaggregated by race/ethnicity and gender as well as first generation, DSPS, LGBT, foster youth, homeless, economically disadvantaged, and veteran statuses. Users can further disaggregate these student groups by gender to examine intersectionality.




The Curious Giant asks: Is the COS student population representative of the high school graduates in our service area?

We respond!

Examining the gender and race/ethnicity breakdown for COS first-time students and the graduates from our feeder high schools indicates that their overall demographic distribution closely mirrors each other. However, female students (-1.2%) were slightly underrepresented at COS when compared to feeder high graduates. Hispanics (+0.7%) and students of two or more races/ethnicities (+1%) accounted for a slightly greater proportion of COS first-time student population when compared to feeder high graduate population.






The Curious Giant asks: What are COS students' educational goals?

We respond!

In Fall 2022, a majority (77%) of COS students were seeking some type of Associate Degree. Specifically, 38% of students enrolled at COS in Fall 2022 were seeking an Associate Degree for Transfer, and 34% were seeking an Associate Degree. Additionally, 5% of students were seeking an Associate Degree in Nursing. Nearly 1 in 10 students were seeking a certificate, while 14% were either K-12 students or students who had not yet selected a program of study.

The Curious Giant asks: Within the University of California System, where are COS transfer students being accepted and which campuses are they attending?

We respond!

Among the 111 COS transfer students, who applied to at least one UC campus in the 2021-2022 academic year, 77 students were accepted, which is a 69% acceptance rate. UC Riverside (66%) had the highest acceptance rate, followed by UC Santa Cruz (60%) and UC Merced (59%). Additionally, 37 COS transfer students enrolled in a UC campus, with 27% enrolling at UC Riverside (N = 10) and 22% enrolling at UC Davis (N = 8).





The Curious Giant asks: What was the acceptance rate for COS transfer students applying to CSUs in Fall 2023?

We respond!


Approximately nine out of 10 COS transfer students (90.4%), who applied to the California State University (CSU) System in Fall 2023, were accepted to at least one CSU campus, which is three percentage points greater than the acceptance rate of all transfer students applying to the CSU System (86.9%), and similar to the acceptance rate of all California Community College transfer students applying to the CSU System (89.7%). Among COS students who applied to the CSU System, female students had a slightly higher percentage accepted to at least one CSU campus when compared to male students. Additionally, among groups with 10+ applicants, Multi-ethnic (Two or more races) and Asian American female students as well as female students with an unknown race/ethnicity had the highest acceptance rates.



The Curious Giant asks: Which In-State Private and Out-of-State Institutions have COS students transferred to over the past five years?

We respond!

Over the past five years, 1,328 COS students have transferred to an In-State Private or Out-of-State Institution. Of those students, 864 (65%) COS students transferred to an Out-of-State institution and 464 (35%) transferred to an In-State Private Institution. Below is a list of the top five destinations for COS transfer students over the past five years for In-State Private and Out-of-State institutions.

The Curious Giant asks: How do COS transfer students perform at CSUs compared to all students who transfer to a CSU from a California Community College?

We respond!

Over the past five years, students who transferred from College of the Sequoias to a California State University (CSU) had an average transfer GPA ranging from 3.2 to 3.3, and their average CSU GPA after one year also ranged from 3.2 to 3.3. COS transfer students had a similar or slightly higher transfer GPA and CSU GPA after one year compared to all students who transferred from a California Community College to a CSU.



Additionally, COS transfer students are consistently more likely to be enrolled full-time (12+ units) and have a higher average unit load compared to all students who transferred to a CSU from a California Community College.

You can then filter on race/ethnicity, gender/sex, and residency as well as CSU Campus.
