What are the strengths of your area?: The full time anthropology instructor accepted the 2019 Governor's Historic Program Award, as a member of the Manzanar Community Archaeology Program, during a ceremony in the Stanley Mosk Library/Courts Building, Capitol Mall, Sacramento, CA, January 22, 2020. The collections of Anthropology Program artifacts and teaching models will have a permanent and locked storage in Fall 2021. The Anthropology Program also accepted a donation of anthropology and ethnic studies reference books from a private library collection in Summer 2021. The Anthropology Program expanded course offerings in Fall 2020 with ANTH 113: Magic, Witchcraft, and Religion (CSU/UC transferable as of January 2021). Anthropology courses continue to fill with Wait Lists in cultural anthropology (ANTH 10) and biological anthropology (ANTH 11). Cultural and biological anthropology and archaeology (ANTH 12) sections offered in multiple modalities (e.g. face to face and distance ed.) during typical semesters, made the program's 2020-2021 swing to remote learning successful. Adjunct instructors support all modalities, evenings, and Hanford Center and Tulare Center course offerings. The full time instructor volunteered to teach 4-face to face classes for the Fall 2021 semester after consulting with the adjunct anthropology faculty. Combined, the anthropology instructors generate 89.20 FTES (2020-21) with a Productivity of 22.30 (2020-21), and FTEF of 4.0 (2020-21). Increasing courses in the AA-T Anthropology in a variety of modes supports the District Objective 2.2 (increase student transfers by 10%) and the California Community College Promise "15 to Finish". Program improvements combined with District Objectives and statewide initiatives will support an increase in student transfers.

What improvements are needed?: Equitable learning resources for the Tulare Campus and ANTH 11 Biological Anthropology. Describe any external opportunities or challenges.: Challenges continue for this discipline to locate adjunct faculty that meet minimum qualifications. Title V requirement for COS graduates to complete an ethnic studies course may reduce student demand for ANTH 10 Cultural Anthropology. The student demand for science courses, combined with the limited space for science labs on all campuses, may create an opportunity to offer more ANTH 11 Biological Anthropology.

Overall SLO Achievement: ANTH 10 Cultural Anthropology success rates averages are lower among students self-identified as multi-ethnicity.

Changes Based on SLO Achievement: Requesting the four anthropology faculty read the book, "Power to the Transfer" and discuss.

Overall PLO Achievement: Program level achievement has dropped below the department standard of 80%.

Changes Based on PLO Achievement: Purchase non-human primate skull replicas for the Tulare Campus to ensure there is equitable resources on both campuses where Biological Anthropology is taught and purchase two Ardipithecus skull replicas to stay current with the discipline.

Continue action: All self-reported Race/Ethnicity student groups declined significantly during the 2020-21 academic year. Observing the Multi-Year data on Tableau still has the Anthropology Program above the District on student Success and Enrollments data. The self-reported Asian student group success rate increased over years 2018-19 to 2020-21. Self-reported Multi-Ethnic student group success stayed below 80% over years 2018-19 to 2020-21. The program did not meet the goal of maintaining or increasing student success rate for all Race/Ethnicity groups at or above 80%.

Student success rate has improved within anthropology. Faculty have updated teaching methods, included more visual cues, emphasized inclusion with the selection of more diverse representations of human beings and relationships in images/clipart for presentations.

Native American success rate has dropped-off tableau, these data must not be statistically significant enough to report. All self-reported ethnic groups demonstrate an increased success rate. Exceptions include: Asian and Multi-Ethnicity which both represent a decline in success rate between 2018-2019 and 2019-2020. Even with the aforementioned decline, all groups have moved into the 80-90% range of success according to tableau data for 2019-2020. The department is pleased with a success rate and is committed to maintain 80%+ success rate for all student groups.
