What are the strengths of your area?: 1. Dance students are eager and show an active interest in classes. Participation is high, as the opportunity to dance in person has returned on campus. In addition to the social aspect of dance classes, the benefits of physical activity, including endorphins and adrenaline, have been present and visible through the students' energy level and willingness to try new movements.

2. Enrollment is beginning to grow, as students of all ages, ethnicities and gender are attending a multitude of various dance classes.

3. Faculty are outgoing, upbeat and positive at all times. While maintaining an encouraging environment, faculty are engaging students with a myriad of technical corrections and artistic development. Syllabi are being following consistently, with an emphasis on Student Learning Outcomes.

Surrounding Athletic coaches and other team members have demonstrated strong support towards the dance program.
Words of advice, direction and encouragement are met with eagerness, and a positive feeling of camaraderie is exemplified.
A brand new spirited Dance Team has been assembled to offer dancers additional performance opportunities, while supporting school teams.

What improvements are needed?: 1. A new dance concert wardrobe is needed to flatter a diversity of body types and keep up with current industry standards. In addition, new costumes can be washed and handled with the proper Covid guidelines to keep students' health and safety a priority. Many of the costumes will be worn by different students throughout the year. 2. New storage cabinets are needed, not only to preserve the quality and detail of dance costumes, but additionally to provide a hygienic place to disinfect and secure them utilizing Covid guidelines. Damage free storage is also needed for accessories, props, and footwear that again, are handled by a multitude of students. Proper disinfection and handling are imperative during times of this pandemic.

3. New portable barres are needed to provide additional social distancing as class sizes continue to grow. Students rely on the barres for stability, balance and stretching. For their safety, updated materials for barre production will offer steadiness as well as the opportunity to disinfect efficiently.

4. Renovation of the 3 bathrooms located in Potwisha 101 is needed for hygiene purposes, as well as updating to current standards. Multiple genders utilize the restrooms, often for changing into dance attire. The goal is to provide students with a clean, safe place to attend their physical needs.

A new stereo system/speakers is needed so faculty are able to utilize mobile devices, laptops and tablets as students are socially distant. The ability to instruct socially distant students will be greatly improved when the stereo system is updated.
An update to the flooring will prevent falling and slipping while students are dancing across the floor. A big concern is for dancers wearing tap shoes, which, by nature, have a slick surface. Additionally, flooring that can be easily disinfected using current Covid guidelines will protect students from sweat, dirt and bacteria.

Describe any external opportunities or challenges.: 1. The biggest external opportunity is for students to return to in person learning on campus. The ability to socialize, albeit with face coverings and social distance, has tremendously lifted spirits in dance classes. Making connections and friendships has provided a therapeutic vehicle through which dancers can build strength and confidence within the realm of learning dance.

2. Another opportunity to note is the ability for the Dance Team to perform live at games. Their energy and positivity is soaring with excitement as they prepare for the upcoming season.

1. The biggest external challenge has been the State mandates for face coverings while indoors, which obviously impacts

rigorous activity. Dancers struggle with endurance and stamina. Profuse sweating and the need for "outside breaks" has been challenging for faculty and students alike.

2. Additionally, class attendance has been greatly affected by Covid exposure. Many students stay home responsibly, in hopes that symptoms don't appear.

Overall SLO Achievement: SLO achievement has been steady for the first month of classes. The overall level of the class is the impacting factor. Students come to classes with a variety of dance backgrounds. Some have trained since childhood, while others possess natural ability. The SLO process is much faster in a class where the majority of students have previous dance knowledge. Naturally, a beginner will take more time to achieve the proposed SLO's.

Additionally, inconsistent attendance due to Covid exposure has also affected the SLO's.

Changes Based on SLO Achievement: At this time, I do not plan on making changes to the SLO's, as there are students who are successfully achieving them. Given a normal year, I feel the SLO's will improve in the future.

Rationale (With supporting data): 250 students were enrolled and participated in dance classes in the 2017/18 academic year and each of those students was dancing on a floor that is not constructed to prevent injury and permanent damage. A sprung dance floor is necessary to avoid repetitive strain injuries. A dancer's interest in the quality and consistency of both the sprung floor and dance surface is for artistic performance as well as health reasons. Every step and jump is responded to by the quality of the floor underfoot. Every dance step or jump on an unyielding surface wears down the resilience of the body and brings about the risk of injury and the prospect of long-term damage.

Facilities - Demo and replace existing storage cabinets at north wall. Approximately 45'L x 16'H, multiple shelves. (Active) **Why is this resource required for this action?:** Most SLO's and PLO's for dance require the student to perform in a publicly produced performance. Public performances necessitate the need for costumes. Costumes are an important part of dance production. Each dance has it's own style, look, color, feel, that the choreography, lighting and costumes help to complete the idea. All COS Dance courses perform in the end of the semester concert. Students are required to have their own undergarments, leotards, tights and shoes. All other accessories are supplied by the Dance Department. The Dance director decides to spend money raised by donations to purchase a few new items every semester. As there are between 20-25 dance numbers per semester, costumes are always being reused, re-designed or eliminated. It is essential to have a safe manner in which to store these items.
